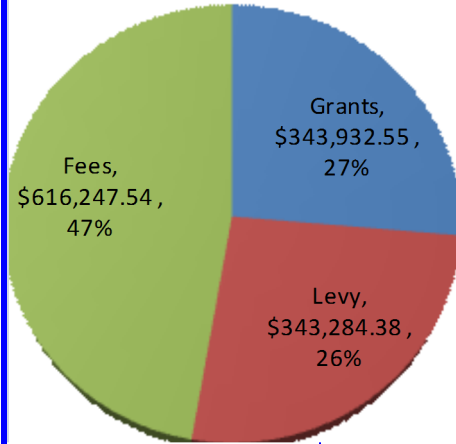

**2015 REVENUE**



The revenue for the Douglas County Health Department is divided into three sections. The first is the county levy that we receive every year. This amount is based on the assessed values of the county and the percent requested by the agency. The 2015 levy was only 26% of the revenue that was utilized by the health department. Grants received from either State, Federal, or Private funders accounted for 27% of the revenue for 2015. The section that provided the largest percentage of the revenues was fees at 47%. These fees are accumulated from services provided by the dental clinic, the nursing clinics, and the environmental fees; such as food, septic, and water permits. The Health Department is able to provide continuous services through the diversity of funding that is generated for the different programs. Last year's levy was 22% of the 2014 revenue.

## Becoming a Mom Class

In the summer of 2015, the DCHD received funding from the March of Dimes for a “Becoming a Mom” Class for mom’s to be. Information is given in a 5 week course on the changes that happen during pregnancy as well as delivery and post-partum in English and Spanish. If a participant attends all of the trainings and participates in the activities and the surveys, they can accumulate “Baby Bucks” to purchase needed baby supplies and equipment. The most

popular purchase so far is the motorized baby swing. Sally Colunga is the instructor for the class and has traveled to different counties to ensure participants are able to learn the information from the class and receive the “Baby Bucks”. So far the participants are delivering healthy term babies and having no troubles with their pregnancies. Because this is a March of Dimes funded grant, this is the overall goal for the program as well as for all of DCHD’s programs and objectives. DCHD looks forward to offering this class even after this grant year ends.

### **Oral Health Services for Amish and Lake Land Care**

In 2014, Douglas County Health Department (DCHD) received \$10,000 to provide restorative services to the Amish children. This funding was received after conducting exam, cleaning, and sealant services through previous funding from Delta Dental and determining that there is a need for restorative services within this population. This funding enables the children to be seen at the schools for the exam and an off-site building for the cleaning and sealants; while receiving their restorative services on site at the Douglas County Health Department at no cost. This provides not only the continued value and care placed on their oral hygiene, but also helps with their maintenance into adult teeth.

In 2014, Douglas County also received funding from the Illinois Children’s Healthcare Foundation to provide off-site oral health restorative services at the Lake Land Dental Hygiene School. These restorative services are a great compliment to the preventative services that have already been done at this location for many years. Because there is a limited amount of providers that accept the Medical Card within Coles County, the DCHD dentist stays very busy with children as well as adult restorative services. Through the funding of both of these providers the Douglas County Health Department is able to meet the needs of Douglas County as well as the surrounding counties.
