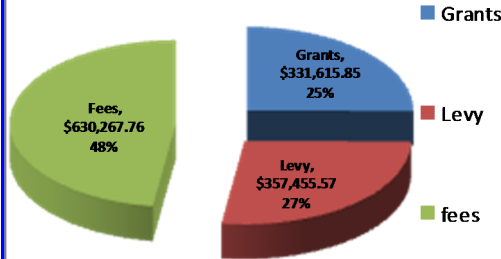

2016 REVENUE



The revenue for the Douglas County Health Department is divided into three sections. The first is the county levy we receive every year. This amount is based on the assessed values of the county and the percent requested. The 2016 levy was just 27% of the revenue that was utilized by the health department. This is an increase of only 1% from the 2015 revenue. Grants received from State, Federal, or Private funders accounted for 25% of the revenue for 2016. The section that provided the largest percentage of the revenues was fees at 48%. These fees are accumulated from services provided by the dental clinic, the nursing clinics, and the environmental fees; such as food, septic, and water permits. The Health Department is able to provide a variety services through the diversity of funding that is generated for the different programs.

Highlights Of Two New Programs In 2016

Teens Living Tobacco-Free In an effort to increase the education on the health dangers of tobacco and to address a notable rise in teen use of e-cigarettes for residents age 13-17, DCHD wrote for and received a grant through the Illinois Tobacco-Free Communities. The grant engaged student groups ages 14-17 through a video competition, "Teens Living Tobacco-Free". Partnerships with four area high schools were facilitated with total award amounts of \$4000 distributed for first, second, third and fourth place. On 4/1/16, video awards were announced. Villa Grove High School awarded 1st Place and received \$2167; Tuscola High School awarded 2nd Place and received \$1167; and Arcola High School awarded \$667 for 3rd. One entry was deemed ineligible thereby dividing the fourth place award of \$500 evenly between the three eligible sub-grantees. Insights showed a total engagement of our demographic (13-17 yrs) of 6,968 individuals with total views of 13,163 6/30/16.

Summer Meals Program In Douglas County, IL In order to address the marked increase in food insecurity, DCHD signed on to be the first ever Douglas County, Illinois sponsor for the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) administered by ISBE in March of 2016. New partnerships were facilitated for our approved service locations at Villa Grove School and the Arthur United Methodist Church; in tandem 19 Douglas County residents volunteered to train and assist with the program. Additional support was offered via Gould Bus Service through daily transportation of 53 youth participants. Throughout the seven weeks the program was offered: 3,709 meals were served; 427 bus pick-ups/drop-offs; and 42 unique educational activities were presented.
