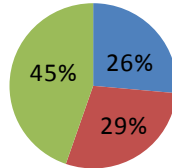

## 2018 REVENUE

### 2018 Revenue

The revenue for the Douglas County Health Department is divided into three sections. The first is the county levy we receive every year. This amount is based on the assessed values of the county and the percent requested. The 2018 levy was just 29% of the revenue that was utilized by the health department. Grants received from State, Federal, or Private funders accounted for 26% of the revenue for 2018. The section that provided the largest percentage of the revenues was fees at 45%. These fees are accumulated from services provided by the dental clinic, the nursing clinics, and the environmental fees; such as food, septic, and water permits. The Health Department is able to provide a variety services through the diversity of funding that is generated from the different programs.

## 2018 Highlights Of Two Of Our Successful Programs

### Douglas County Offering Low Cost CPR Training

Located within the DCHD is the Douglas County Medical Reserve Corps. This organization is dedicated to developing and sustaining a more disaster resilient population throughout the community of which we serve. Through partnerships between the Medical Reserve Corps and the Douglas County Emergency Management Agency, the Douglas County Health Department is able to offer CPR certification through the American Heart Association at a low cost to the community. Between April 2018 and December 2018, 35 community members became certified in CPR and First Aid! The health department offers training for both healthcare professionals and non medical personnel, as well as first aid and AED training. For those who wish to learn CPR but are unable to pay the course fee, free workshops are available for organizations within Douglas County. At our workshops, students learn the same material, but do not receive a course completion card.

### Summer Meals Program In Douglas County, IL

In our ongoing efforts to address food insecurity for area youth, the Douglas County Summer Fun & Meals program increased for the third year in a row. In 2018, we once again expanded the number of meal serving sites and increased our volunteer base, services, partnerships, and fundraising efforts.

- We increased the number of feeding sites to seven and served 13676 summer meals in 41 days in June and July of 2018. Meals were served to 1678 individual youth ranging in age from 5-18 yrs.
- We increased our fundraising and grants to fund additional activity supplies and hot lunches were provided to each site every day in Douglas and Edgar County and prepared in Clark County. Gould Bus Service provided daily transportation to 942 youth participants and scheduled 37 unique educational activities between meals.
- Douglas County Summer Fun & Meals was one of only five summer meal service providers to be awarded the No Kid Hungry Grant in Illinois.
