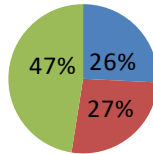

The revenue for the Douglas County Health Department is divided into three sections. The first is the county levy we receive every year. This amount is based on the assessed values of the county and the percent requested. The 2019 levy was just 27% of the revenue that was utilized by the health department. Grants received from State, Federal, or Private funders accounted for 26% of the revenue for 2019. The section that provided the largest percentage of the revenues was fees at 47%. These fees are accumulated from services provided by the dental clinic, the nursing clinics, and the environmental fees; such as food, septic, and water permits. The Health Department is able to provide a variety services through the diversity of funding that is generated from the different programs.

2019 Highlights From Our Successful Programs

- **Summer Meals Site Expansions** - In June of 2019, with the assistance of several VG residents, the Senior Center and the Mayor, DCHD expanded our Summer Meals program sites from 4 to 5. Due to renovations that were not quite complete at the start of the 2019 program in June, participants registered for the VG site were bused to the nearest site for 2 weeks of the program. The Villa Grove site provided 1037 meals in 35 days to area youth.
- **Medical Marijuana and Opioid Alternatives** - In 2019 our department completed the necessary trainings to assist area residents with their enrollment in the State of IL Medical Marijuana program. We were encouraged by the data confirming medical marijuana serves as a viable alternative for many seeking pain management.
- **Application submitted for FQHC** - FQHC is a Federally Qualified Health Center. Stay connected with us for updates in 2020!
- **2 Senior Fairs—April 2019 & Sept 2019** - We partnered with the Lions Club of Tuscola and Lions of IL and welcomed 186 attendees and 56 vendors to our Good Life Fair for 50+ in Tuscola. Our partnership with the Lions Club of Arcola and Lions of IL welcomed 44 vendors and 104 attendees to our Fall event held in Arcola.
- **ITFC/EYPC** - We had 211 Douglas County student participants collaborating with DCHD on prevention, education, and working to strengthen existing school codes and local policies that better support the initiatives Smoke-Free IL Act, Tobacco21, and Illinois Tobacco-Free Communities.
- **Narcan Trainings & Needle Exchange** - We provided 58 Narcan Trainings & 7 Needle Exchanges. The greatest reward is the many life-saving overdose reversals. We are deeply grateful for the number of deaths prevented through our PROMPT program.

MRC In Douglas County, IL

The Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) is a volunteer based program within the Douglas County Health Department. This program has gone through a new and improved transformation phase this past year. What started out as an organization that helps the community to become better prepared, has continued this effort and has added other opportunities and activities to our skill set. The focus this year will be on training for Shelter Management and Shelter operations along with our Medical Countermeasure. This will better prepare MRC for any emergent community needs. MRC put on many training events in 2019 and have trained many new members along with additional community members. Some of these trainings include; activation of a shelter, Until Help Arrives and stop the bleed, diabetic disaster survival needs, and many more. Last year MRC saw 10 new members sign up and join the team and we are anticipating even more for 2020. Anyone can join the team, there is no medical background needed. 2020 Preview

- In our ongoing efforts to eliminate the sale of tobacco and nicotine products to those under 21 years of age, DCHD has partnered with the DCSO, DC State's Atty, & ITFC Grant Managers at C-UPHD to initiate tobacco compliance checks with underage buyers.
- We will again host two area Good Life Fair's for 50+ in 2020. Tuscola location is scheduled for 4/14/20 & Arcola TBA.
- Our Director of Outreach & Director of Emergency Management will be laying the groundwork for a Douglas County youth mentoring program; as well as collaborating their strengths toward an annual fundraising event for the Douglas County Tactical Patrol Unit in May 2020.
